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Introducing Lex Bouter

To preview our plenary session on Saturday, we asked Professor Lex Bouter some quick questions about his work and what he hopes for the conference.

What is your main area of research? Selective reporting and selective citation.

How long have you been involved in this area? About 3 years. Before that I was an epidemiologist, in the sense of scholar on the methods of clinical research.

What do you feel are your most significant achievements? The development of tools to assess the quality of primary papers, systematic reviews and clinical measurement instruments. My papers on these tools are cited most. My best paper is probably not yet written.

Which sessions are you are looking forward to over the weekend?

A few days ago I was invited to speak during a COPE session on whistleblowing. I look forward to that because that's a topic I have many questions on and I hope to get some answers during the event in Strasbourg.

Dining out

Delegates may like to try one of the popular winstubs— restaurants serving the traditional Alasatian cuisine of the region.

Chez Yvonne was originally named S'Burjerstuewel in 1956, and serves dishes such as Salty crème brulée made with fattened goose served with fig and nut bread, Knuckle of pork with potato salad or sauerkraut, raifort and of course—sausage and sauerkraut. Find it at 10 rue du Sanglier.

For a different type of cuisine, Maison Kammerzell, is situated close to the Cathedral (16 place de la cathédrale), and dates back to 1427! It serves fish, meat and sauerkraut



dishes including pikeperch, crayfish, guinea fowl, and risottos.
